Recall that in the January 2011 Newsletter, Co -Chair Dale Andersen reported that our USS Nebraska won the Battle E for 2010. Well, given our diverse membership, I began to wonder if all of us knew what the Battle E means and what it signifies to our Blue and Gold Crews and to all our ship serves. So this is an attempt to shed a bit more light on this very prestigious honor.

Even though the officers and men and (soon to be women) are all incredibility talented, good looking, and snappy dressers. The Battle E is certainly not a popularity or a beauty contest. The Battle E is shorthand for Battle Effectiveness Award, and is earned and given to a very small number of US Navy surface ships, submarines, aviation units, and other support units of the fleet. The USS Nebraska won the award over a one year period for being the best in it's class in readiness to carry out its assigned patrol and wartime tasks.

To qualify , much less win over other "Tridents" our ship had to win a minimum of 3 out of 4 Command Excellent Awards (Maritime Warfare, Command and Control, Engineering / Survivability, and Logistics Management). Only then would she be nominated by her immediate Superior Command. This is not just a snapshot performance. It requires rigorous day - to - day excellence stem to stern. The men of the USS Nebraska undergo frequent inspections and certifications in 16 different categories, among which are weapons and tactical readiness.

As they say however, this goes way beyond mission accomplishment. When we cheer the best ship under the seas, the Blue and Gold of Nebraska flat-out "Walk the Walk & Talk the Talk"..



# **111 YEARS OF PROGRESS IN SUBMARINES**



## USS HOLLAND (SS 1)

She was the first US Navy's commissioned submarine, named after John P Holland an inventor, but not the first US Navy Submarine. That was the 1862 Alligator.

Decommissioned 7 July 1905, was sold on 18 July 1913, was on display in a park in Paterson, New Jersey, until it was sold for scrap in 1932. Many of John Holland's proven concept used in the USS Holland were used into the 20<sup>th</sup> century submarines, both the internal combustion engine for running on the surface and the electric motor for running Submerged. 

## NAVY NAMES FOUR SUBMARINES TO CARRY WOMEN

The Navy selected four submarines to carry the first women to serve aboard what has been the last class of military vessels off limits to them. Twenty-four Female Officers are in training for submarine services are expected to join their boats in December 2011. The Navy selected the USS Wyoming SSBN 742 and the USS Georgia SSGN 729, homeport in Kings Bay, Georgia and the USS Maine SSBN 741 and the USS Ohio SSGN 726 homeport in Bangor, Washington.

The 560-foot nuclear-powered ballistic or cruise-missile submarines chosen are big by submarine standards, allowing the Navy greater flexibility in designing accommodations for women. The initial class of women will serve teams of three, all sharing a stateroom. The lone head for Officers will bear a reversible sign, leaving men to know that it's in use by women.
